Quality Education

Education is the great equalizer. A good education provides the skills and experiences to gain confidence, contribute to community, build critical thinking skills, and to secure a job.

Intergenerational Innovation

When schools shut down, SAGE offered its seventh **Legacy Fellowship** to train and support seven fellows to launch projects to help students recover from a tough year at school.

Our fellows are leading inspiring projects that promote mental health, heal trauma, help immigrant and refugee parents and their students, build hope and resiliency among Black youth, promote civics education, and provide onramps to college for students experiencing homelessness.

Mentoring Youth

This year, in response to the pandemic, we launched the **SAGE Mentors Program** with Parkrose Middle School.

Today, nearly 20 older adults mentor students online. This win-win brings generations together, supports students in school, and helps older adults experience the joy of mentoring.



Too many Oregon students are reading below grade levels. In schools where many students are still learning English, the challenges are greater. Through our SAGE Mentors program, we pair students who are learning to read with older adults who serve as mentors. The friendships that form and the learning that happens on both sides is inspirational.

Legacy Fellow Spotlight



6,000 children die every day from water and sanitation-related diseases. Working with a great team of volunteers, Legacy Fellow Dave Conklin is deploying an innovative technology, The Water Box, to supply safe drinking

To ensure that coming generations inherit a clean, livable world, SAGE connects people of all generations to environmental causes.

Accelerating Electric Mobility

SAGE's EVs for All team offers education, outreach, electric vehicle (EV) charging stations and electric vehicles to older adults to increase awareness and use of electric vehicles. We are also developing two EV car-share programs to promote e-mobility among seniors and their friends and families. Working with Portland General Electric and our other partners, we focus attention on how EVs help people overcome barriers to transportation to remain civically engaged, to breath clean air, and to build connections.

Promoting Climate Education

Our Vision 2030 team offers lessons on climate solutions and justice for middle and high school students that empower students as partners to achieve the Portland and Multnomah County climate goal of reducing greenhouse gas emissions by 50 percent from 1990 levels by the year 2030. We have presented lessons to over 1,000 students. Last year, we partnered with Portland Public Schools to host a major Climate Careers Summit for over 800 high school students.

Promoting Economic Opportunity

Not since the Great Depression has America faced the level of street homelessness, tent cities and people struggling without a safe place to call home.

Focusing on Generational Poverty

We hosted our 2021 Visiting SAGE on breaking the cycle of generational poverty with nationally-renowned speakers, Drs. Donna Beegle and Shariff Abdullah. Together they shared powerful stories from their personal experiences in poverty to inspire us to find tangible and lasting solutions to prevent these cycles from continuing.

Addressing our Housing Crisis

SAGE hosted an important series to learn and share views on how Oregonians and people around the country are responding to the ongoing housing crisis on our streets and what we can do about it. We focused attention on the causes of homelessness, how communities are responding, and spotlighted actions people can take to make progress on this major challenge.

Building Civic Bridges

Communities face many challenges in education, the environment, and the economy. When we take time to listen and learn from each other, we can build bridges and find enduring solutions.



SAGE Board Member Sheila Panyam co-facilitated a threepart series on why democracy matters, with Multnomah County Library and

Civics for Adults. Guests explored the meaning of democracy, our right to vote, and how we measure progress as a nation.

Building Bridges

Through our Citizen Project, we offered six events to address Americans' increasing divisions on how to address public problems, and we shared examples of actions people take to bridge divides — learning about self, listening to diverse views, and identifying areas to work together. We also hosted our fourth state-wide convening to support collaboration among bridge-building organizations.

Leadership Opportunities

SAGE's Young Leaders Advisory Board (LAB) hosted a meaningful intergenerational series on expanding perspectives across social and political divides. LAB Leaders also participated in our fourpart series on Civics 101 to raise awareness about local government and how to get involved.

Honoring Leadership & Innovation

We hosted our **SAGE Awards** to honor Jay Bloom and the intergenerational housing community, Bridge Meadows. We recognized Jay for his remarkable gift of inspiring others to be their best selves.

We honored Bridge Meadows for their innovative work to develop and sustain intentional, intergenerational communities for youth formerly in foster care, adoptive families, and elders.
